

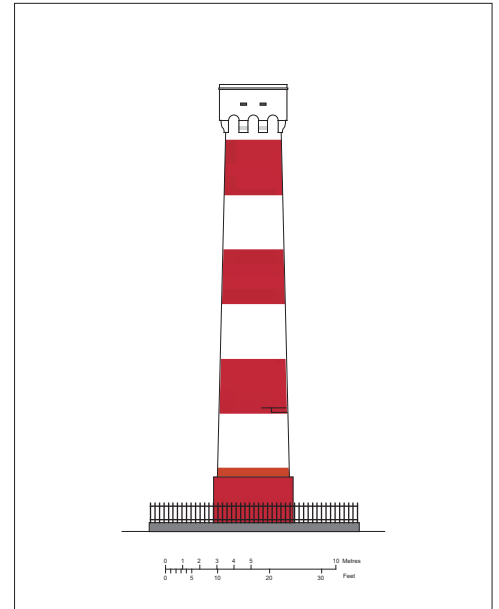
# GRIBBIN HEAD DAYMARK

## Historical Notes

This distinctive 25.4m(84') tower was built by Trinity House in 1832 to distinguish Gribbin Head in Cornwall from a nearby headland that marked the entrance to a safe harbour. The tower was erected on land that later belonged to the author Daphne De Maurier. The daymark is currently managed by the National Trust and has recently been renovated. It is open to the public some days of the year and after climbing the steep spiral staircase, the visitor is rewarded with a glorious view.

## Assembly Instructions

- Study the scoring and cutting key below.
- Use a small sharp scissors or a craft knife to cut out the parts.
- All parts should be scored and any openings cut out before cutting out the part.
- Use clear multi-purpose glue or PVA glue to assemble the model.

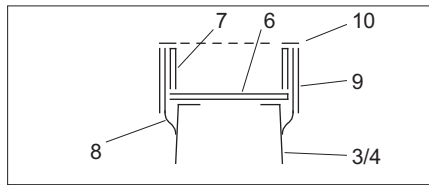


Figure 1 - Cross-section of top of tower

- Assemble parts in numerical order (Figure 1 shows how the top of the tower fits together)
- Sub-parts are marked a, b, c... and should be assembled in alphabetical order.
- Glue the base and plinth (parts 1 & 2) to thicker card for extra stiffness.

↺	- Roll part by bending this side
