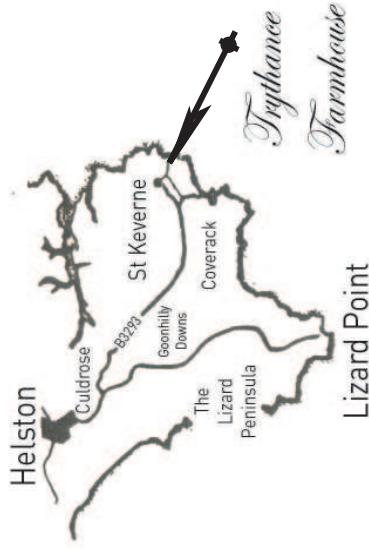

From Helston, take the A3083 signed to the Lizard, turn left at the roundabout after RNAS Culdrose signed B3293 to St Keverne. Stay on this road passing Goonhilly Downs on your right, after 2.5 miles turn right on the B2394 signed "Roskilly's Ice Cream Parlour" at the "T" junction past the farm, turn right, Trythance Farmhouse will be found on the right hand side after 400 yards.

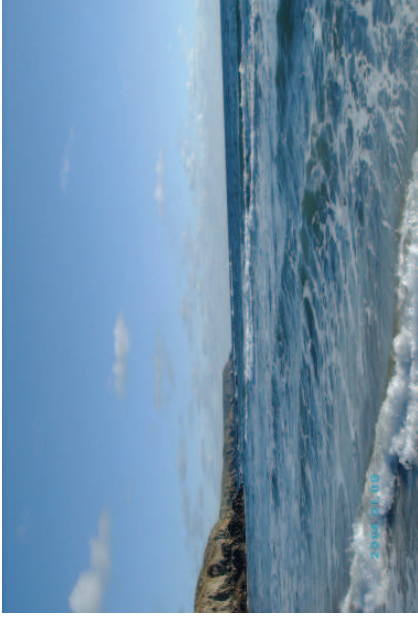

THE LOCAL AREA.

The Village of St. Keverne is just two minutes away with its attractive village square and two traditional Cornish pubs, a 15th Century church, a grocer, Post Office, newsagent and a popular organic restaurant.



To those with a hint of romance in their blood, a short stay will evoke lasting memories of a landscape rich in heathland, standing stones and cliff paths, to say nothing of the sound of the bell at The Manacles - the scene of several notorious shipwrecks a century ago - now guiding seamen to the safe haven of Falmouth harbour.

Catch a glimpse of the seals basking at Lowland Point only 15 minutes walk (down some steep steps!) on the waters edge, before sampling a traditional pasty or dine in one of the fabulous waterside pubs close by, the choice is endless ...

The Lizard Peninsula is a place of contrasts.

Dramatic cliffs around Kynance and Lizard Point present a rugged face to the elements while, to the east, the softer, greener landscape of the Helford River reveals an entirely different side.



A lush wooded world of inlets and creeks, of sub-tropical gardens and riverside villages, of oyster beds and boats of all sizes. Much of the area around the river is best explored on foot or by boat. Peaceful villages, such as Manaccan, nestle in the folds of the landscape. Helford village is in a delightful riverside setting with pub, tea garden and foot ferry across the river.

An 'Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty', much of the coastline is under the stewardship of the National Trust. The South West Coast Path winding its way around the Peninsula provides beautiful walks for ramblers of all ages and abilities.

Beaches are among the finest - crystal clear water and pale sand are the very essence of this part of Cornwall.



Echoes of a proud fishing industry remain in Cadgwith and Coverack a small fleet of boats still survives.

These are archetypal Cornish fishing villages; a cluster of nets, lobster pots and boats; whitewashed cottages and picturesque creekside pubs.

During the summer, boat and fishing trips are available.



Nearby St. Anthony - being one of several places where sailing dinghies and motor boats can be hired and sailing tuition is available, clings to the side of Gillan Creek.

Up river, past Daphne du Maurier's Frenchman's Creek, is the Trelowarren estate, home to the Vyvyan family since 1427. Ancient gardens and woodland walks, a pottery and craft centre are open to the public.
