

Baptist

Founded in 1609 by John Smith, Church of England and Thomas Helwys of Amsterdam. Separating from the Armenian Church over infant baptism, baptists believing in adult baptism.

Later they split into open communion baptists (General Baptist) and closed communion (Strict Baptist)
General Baptist also known as Anabaptists

In Portsmouth some of the General Baptists became Unitarian

In 1663 John Spilsbury parted from the Independents and formed a Calvinistic church which later became the Particular Baptists.

The Methodist revival induced a schism in the General Baptists and hence the New Connection, which in 1891 united with the Particular Baptists.

1640 Onwards various preachers visit Portsmouth

1787 Joined the Western Alliance

1823 Western Alliance dissolved and Southern Alliance formed
